		Tansley A correspondent who prefers to be anonymous, writes:- In answer to your enquiry about the crops in this district, I may say, like the rest of the country, the season's growth of agricultural produce has been very disappointing. All natural grass for hay is much below the average. Seeds are a fair crop. We have some good fields of wheat, but the bulk will be below the average. Oats are short in the straw, but the grain is filling nicely. Mangolds and potatoes are looking well, and are likely to prove a fair crop. Turnips got such a poor start, owing to the extremely hot, dry weather, that it is scarcely likely they will be up to the average of former years.

28 Dec 1901		GLEANINGS IN THE PEAK There was reported to P.c.Storey, at the Tansley Police Station, last Friday night, the sudden death of Mrs Marianne Vaughan, at Portland Grange, Matlock Bank. An examination of the body showed no trace of anything but that death was due to natural causes and the information was given by Mr Hurd that the deceased came to his house on the 26th of June last as a paying guest. She had never had complained of anything excepting a pain at her heart, at different times during the past few weeks. A telegram was sent to a sister of the deceased, residing at Liverpool, for further information, as nothing was known of her at Matlock, and her age could not be stated, as she always declined to give it. The facts were forwarded to Supt. Hollingworth, but Mr Taylor, the coroner, decided that no inquest would be necessary, as death was due to natural causes, viz., to heart disease.
